HOW ABOUT THESE CONDITIONS?!

The ARRL DX SSB contest recently ended, and what a month it has been! Conditions were very good for both modes of the ARRL DX contests. Seasoned DX contesters will recall that the best conditions are not always at the very peak of the sunspot cycle, but sometimes are even better on the way up or way down from the peak. One reason is that there are fewer solar disturbances further from the peak, resulting in better overall conditions on all six HF contesting bands. While 160 meters was not especially great for the SSB DX contest, 10 meters more than made up for it. Stations were lined up all the way beyond 29 MHz both days. Enjoy these conditions while you can; they won't last forever.

The 20 meter 6/6/6/6 run stack at K3LR. AD4EB shares some recollections from his adventures in West Middlesex, PA below.

The 2024 ARRL DX CW weekend is one that I will never forget. I was offered the unique opportunity to operate at the K3LR super station in western PA, which I did not hesitate to jump on. The TCG was well represented with Kirk K4RO and Brad WF7T, who are regulars at K3LR, and me the TNG (the new guy).

It is difficult to convey in words the magnitude and quality of the station. Tim K3LR has built a world class station with 13 towers and 11 operating positions. All of the equipment and construction is top notch and the best of the best. The accompanying photos may give you some idea. The tower in the photo is over 240 ft high and supports the 20m stack of 6L/6L/6L/6L that Kirk and I used. As you can

see, Tim's ham shack is just simply extraordinary. Operating at this station is a dream. It seemed like everyone could hear us, and we could hear everyone.

The band conditions were some of the best I have ever witnessed, and the team took full advantage, setting a new world record in the Multi-Multi category. The best part of the weekend was the camaraderie. The entire team made this TNG feel very welcomed.

K4RO would like to add...

This was a banner year at K3LR. Not only were there three TCG members on the K3LR team, but we managed to beat the K1LZ Maine "Death Star" station team *and* set a new record in the process! This was no small feat, and your TCG members were a crucial part of that effort. Operating at K3LR requires a unique skill set, plus a *lot* of patience and dedication to team work. AD4EB had never done in-band operation before, and he did remarkably well at it. Knowing that Jim was a highly-skilled SO2R operator, I knew that he would quickly understand the QSO interleaving concept. In no time at all, Jim was operating like an old M/M pro. Brad ground out every available 80 meter CW QSO with K3UA, and we were thrilled to see them cross the 1000 QSO barrier. The post-contest team dinner was especially fine, with Tim's leadership and hospitality shining bright like the beacons on his towers.

TCG ARRL DX CONTEST SCORES

The ARRL DX Contests did NOT disappoint this year! The bands were *hot*. Great conditions bring up activity to unprecedented levels. Nothing beats ten meters being wide open for DX contacts. Once folks turn on the radio and have a blast on ten meters, there's a natural tendency to check out the other bands. Great activity begets more activity, and when conditions are great on all bands, that's when DX contest records are set. The 2024 ARRL DX Contests featured nearly ideal "Goldilocks" conditions on all bands. A quick look at 380scores.com shows some remarkable scores generated by TCG on both modes. There were some great tales to go with these scores as well on the TCG email reflector.

HOW IT ALL STARTED - Ned Swartz, K1GU

This is my story – and I'm sticking to it!

I'm from the Boston area, married to an East Tennessee gal, and am a (University of) Tennessee Dad. I joined TCG just before arriving permanently 20 years ago. Except for the personal details, my start in radio is not much different from what has appeared here earlier; crystal set with a cat's whisker as a cub scout. I wound the coil with enameled wire. My uncle, who had been to navy radar school, "installed" a wire antenna in the attic of my family's rented house. I fell asleep to the Red Sox games with a magnetic headset under my pillow.

Between my 5th and 6th grade years (in 1958) my parents bought a house, and I got my own bedroom. They had a Westinghouse "table" radio the size of a microwave oven with AM, FM, and a shortwave band. After dark the propaganda stations came blasting in the 7 Mhz broadcast band; Radio Moscow, VOA, BBC, Radio Free Europe. It was during the height of the cold war. My parents gave me their old "kitchen" radio, a white phenolic RCA; AM plus two SW bands. It took up residence next to my bed, where I listened to the 50 KW AM stations across the northern states. SWL DXing I suppose.

I heard the hams on AM phone and thought that talking back and forth was pretty amazing. I enrolled in a class leading to the Novice exam at the Boston Museum of Science, mostly teens, but also a good number of adults. At the exam, mysteriously, or maybe miraculously, I somehow put down 25 straight correct characters. The instructors went over the written test answers so I knew I passed. My uncle gave me a Heathkit AR-3. He taught me how to solder and supervised me over several Saturdays. Amazingly, it worked when I finished assembly, but only up to 15 MHz or so.

Thanks to the ARRL Handbook and a shelf of QSTs at the library, I put up a low 40M dipole. I skipped lunch at school to save my allowance and bought a Globe Scout 680 and a novice band crystal. I was ready to go when my ticket arrived in the mail after 3 months, last day of school, 8th grade, June 1961. My call sign was KN1SOP. I soon found I had no idea what to do. None of my CQ's were

answered. Perhaps because they were 5 minutes long? I resorted to going to a house marked with a tower and a TA-33 and rang the bell. I was met by K1OQX (SK) and his blind son my age, K1NDF. They put me on 80 and talked me through my first QSO.

Through the rest of high school and college I went through a series of radios then sold everything after commissioning in the air force. Got back on the air at Navigator training in CA, went directly to Asia, came back to TX, bought an S-Line, then a house. Married the girl from TN next door. Left her at the alter for Okinawa (KR6CN and visiting op at KG6ALY), back to K1SOP/5, then Asia but KR6 calls no longer valid. TX again, chose to remain married and leave the air force but they sent me back 1 mo' time. Then grad school in Boston and resumed flying in the air guard. Ham with a semiconductor test start-up hired me. Got a house. Sold the still boxed S-Line. Two kids showed up. Went to a defense job at a MIT lab. (Not smart or nerdy enough to go to school there but OK to work.) Retired from the air force w/27.5 years. Jumped back on the air in 1999 feet first into contesting after some 22 years essentially QRT. Joined YCCC where I actually knew people from high school days, after which I got my K1GU call.

HAMVENTION 2024

I highly recommend that every avid contest operator check out The Hamvention at least once. There's nothing quite like being among a bunch of contesters. Contest University (CTU) is a great opportunity to meet and learn from fellow contesters. There is no better opportunity to place a name with a call, and share stories and tips with the folks we work regularly. Nobody understands a contester like a fellow contester. Discover that you are not alone!
